FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parish Family,

The week before Christmas the children of our Academy presented a beautiful Christmas concert for our enjoyment- each class sang a song that delighted the parents, families, faculty and parishioners that attended. The highlight of the concert for me was the presentation of the Eighth Grade story of the Nativity. The academy music teacher Rosa Lengua wrote a type of play taking as her theme the first *Christmas* Nativity scene presented by St. Francis of Assisi in the small Italian town of Greccio in the 13th Century. It was always the dream of St. Francis to travel from Assisi to the Holy Land to visit the places of Christ's birth and to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the sultan and those who never heard of Him. Although he didn't win many converts to Christianity, the sultan (who admitted to Francis "if there were more Christians like you, I would become a follower of Christ") gave him safe passage to the places of Christ's life. After experiencing the cave of Bethlehem, St. Francis returned to Italy and told a friend: "I want to do something that will recall the memory of that Child who was born in Bethlehem, to see with bodily eyes the inconveniences of His infancy, how He lay in the manger, and how the ox and ass stood by." Traveling to the town of Greccio, he set up a manger in a cave, using live animals. Through these visual aids Francis wanted everyone to understand more deeply how Christ came into the world in such poverty and simplicity. St. Bonaventure tells us that Francis did these three years before his death, and only after receiving permission from the Pope to erect this first Nativity. In describing that first Nativity scene in Greccio, St. Bonaventure wrote: "The man of God (St. Francis) stood before the manger, full of devotion and piety, bathed in tears and radiant with joy; the Holy Gospel he chanted. Then he preached to the people around the Nativity of the poor King; and being unable to utter His name for the tenderness of His love, Francis called Him the Babe of Bethlehem." This custom of erecting a Nativity scene has become part of the tradition of our churches as well as our homes. What was especially moving for me as I listened to our Academy 8th Grade tell the story of St. Francis and the first Nativity scene was the fact that I visited Greccio this past October and was able to see the cave of the first Nativity scene (today contained within a small but beautiful Church).

This year at St. Paul's, in light of the story of St. Francis in Greccio as well as our own parish pilgrimage to the Holy Land, I wanted to do something different that would highlight our own parish experience of the Nativity scene. Those of you who came on Christmas Eve or Day certainly noticed the live animals that were part of our outdoor scene. This was not done as a gimmick or novelty, but as a way to draw people's attention to the 'poverty and simplicity' surrounding the birth of the Christ Child. And, this year, our indoor Nativity scene looks different than usual. Instead of a wooden stable, which was certainly not the setting of the actual birth of Christ (wooden structures in the Holy Land were not common-there are few trees there), we wanted to evoke the idea of the true Bethlehem cave, the place where ancient families would have kept their animals. During our parish pilgrimage to Bethlehem last November, we visited this cave (now existing under the altar of the Church of the Nativity which was built on top by St. Helena). Looking more closely at our parish Nativity scene this year, you might also notice some elements that connect it to the altar: candles as well as the thurible (the metal bowl used for incense on a chain) remind us that the Christ of Bethlehem is the Christ present during each celebration of Holy Mass all year long and how important it is to adore Him there).

This weekend as we celebrate the *Feast of the Holy Family*, we pray that these images of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, united and love and open to the will of God, will be models for each of our own families. This year once again we invite each family to take home a parish calendar with the theme "*Twentieth Century Saints*" (provided for us by *VanEmburghPernice Funeral Home* and to whom we are very grateful for their generosity). May they remind us of our own call this year to become Saints, but not alone- within the context of our families and our parish family. May Joseph and Mary pray for us! Merry Christmas once again! And rich blessings in the New Year.

FATIMA: A MESSAGE FOR OUR TIME: REPARATION THROUGH THE FIRST SATURDAY DEVOTION

During the apparitions of Our Lady in Fatima, our Blessed Mother showed the visionaries her heart surrounded with piercing thorns, which represented the offenses committed against her – and were the sins that needed reparation through the 'First Saturday devotion'. To fulfill the First Saturday devotion, Mary asked that the faithful:

- confess their sins,
- receive Holy Communion,
- recite 5 decades of the Rosary,
- and keep Our Lady company for 15 minutes while meditating on the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary,

The two conditions necessary for the devotion are that the practices be done on the first Saturday of five consecutive months, and that they be done with the intention of making reparation to our Lady for the sins of blasphemy and ingratitude against her. Mary promised that she will assist at the moment of death with all graces necessary for salvation to all who make this devotion. Jesus subsequently appeared to Sr. Lucia, encouraging this devotion to be made not once, but over and over again.







THERE IS NO HEALTH WITHOUT MENTAL HEALTH



Did you know that approximately 1 in 4 adults are affected by mental illnesses, such as depression, anxiety or alcohol and substance use disorders? Despite the prevalence of mental illness, more than half of people affected will not seek treatment. The primary reason individuals fail to seek the help they need is due to the stigma associated with the disease of mental illness. Such stigmas evoke a sense of shame and fear of judgment from friends, family and co-workers. These stigmas are often based in a lack of knowledge or training.

Earlier this year, Ramsey Mayor Deirdre Dillon, asked me to join a committee whose goal is to disseminate information and foster a stigma-free environment where people are free from judgment and can get the help and support they need. Through powerful words and actions, we aim to shift the social and systemic barriers for those living with mental health conditions. We are dedicated to raising awareness of the disease of mental illness and creating a culture wherein people who may suffer from a mental health disease feel supported by their community and neighbors to seek treatment without the fear of stigma.


Joining the Stigma-Free Initiative will: *Educate residents that mental illness is a disease and must be treated as such. *Raise awareness of the prevalence of mental illness in our community. *Provoke public interest in learning what is "STIGMA-FREE". *Provide residents an opportunity to become involved in their community. *Allow people living with the disease to feel supported by their community and thus decrease feelings of isolation and shame. *Link people in need to local mental health resources. *Raise awareness that care is accessible regardless of income.
